Where Did You Go?

If you hear about someone who has gone on a vacation, one of the natural questions would be "Where did you go?" If the response strikes a chord, we might well follow up with more questions and learn something about that place (if we hadn't been there ourselves.) If we have been there ourselves, we might see if the person's experience was similar to ours. (When I hear if someone has been to Door County, Wisconsin, for example, I want to know if he or she has consumed some Wilson's Ice Cream.)

Sometimes the question of where someone went, however, is not a positive one. Maybe we couldn't find the person or maybe he or she has purposely gone missing to avoid a situation. Maybe the person has engaged in negative behaviors contrary to what has been his/her history, and we wonder, "Where did the real you go?"

There are people who wonder where God has gone....in their lives in general, in a particular situation of crisis or hurt or death, in a struggle for what to do, in a time of uncertainty or disaster, or in any number of other circumstances. (That there are others who also have been there and can relate to the question need not surprise us.)

The Bible itself has multiple stories of people who have raised the question. The Psalms are filled with people who wonder out loud for all to hear about their concern God has taken a hike and gone missing. In this season of Lent and Holy Week, including Good Friday, we see even Jesus wrestling with this question. From the cross he quotes Psalm 22: My God, my God, why have you forsaken me?

The question is certainly honest and importantly heartfelt....and is not the last word. In fact, Jesus knew the rest of Psalm 22, the truth of which Jesus had seen throughout his ministry. The lepers, the prostitutes, the tax collectors, the ill and unwanted ones had been cast aside so many times they had to believe even God had gone missing. But Jesus wouldn't let that feeling be the last word for any of them. By his own presence, he answered the question with an emphatic "Right here!" That presence was with Jesus himself as he later said from the cross, "Into your hands I commend my spirit," right through his dying, right into the wonderful resurrection. That presence is consistently here today, even when we can't see or feel it. Look for it, and learn from others who have been there, too. It is an amazing discovery to know we are never without God no matter where we go.

Dear Members and Friends of Peace,

The season of Lent is upon us and this is the month that we will await Easter. I love the season of Lent because it gives time for us as individuals and as a church to reflect, but I also dislike Lent for the same reason. Sometimes it is hard to reflect on your past actions, thoughts, words. This Lenten discipline can become too much if we think of it as a dirty laundry list of all our mistakes and sins. However, this is not the focus of Lent. Last month we had our annual youth retreat, Antioch. This year the theme was C.R.O.S.S. which stands for Christ Redeems Our Sin and Suffering. This is the focus of Lent! As I was teaching our youth about this important theme, we talked about what the word redeem means. What does it mean to redeem something? If you redeem something you give it back its value. Lent is the time we realize that Christ has redeemed God's people! We as a people, left to our own devices would not live up to our true value as God's children. Through Christ love, his word, and his teaching we are redeemed, our value is restored. This gift of the cross is not just a one time sacrifice and gift that can be lost again but is rather a living sacrifice that is given repeatedly. Our value is reclaimed and proclaimed to us each moment of our lives. I constantly remind our youth that there is nothing any of us can do to make God love us more and there is nothing we can do to make God love us less. Our sin has been redeemed and our value restored. Our suffering has been redeemed and our hearts restored. May we reflect not on our list of failings but instead on the vastness that is the love of God.

Because of You and Your Gifts

On a half-acre on the island of Nias, Indonesia, Yaatulo and his wife, Mariata, grow bananas to support themselves and their two children. While they work hard, the income from the bananas wasn't enough to support the family. One day while working, Yaatulo heard about a development program of the Center for Disaster Risk Management & Community Development Studies, which is supported by gifts to ELCA World Hunger. He decided to join, and soon he had the support to borrow enough money for chili seed. Over two months, Yaatulo and Mariata planted more than 1,000 chili bushes. Chilis can be harvested multiple times per year, giving farmers more opportunities to sell them at market and have extra income. Thanks to your gifts, farmers like Yaatulo have improved access to tools, training, livestock, seeds and more that will help their families increase farm production and have more to eat and sell at market.
