Oh, You Better Watch Out

You probably have heard the words to the song, Santa Claus Is Coming to Town. They include: "Oh, you better watch out....so be good for goodness sake!" Millions of kids around the beginning of December are going to try their best to follow the dictum. With modern help from the Elf on the Shelf, eyes are being trained on children to see who makes the cut for the good/nice list. And how successful are the kids at being good? The ones who were mostly good from January through November are probably going to be mostly good in December; and the ones who were trouble the rest of the year probably can only minimally improve in month number twelve.

What doesn't seem to change from the time we are children through adulthood is the concept that you better watch out. With people looking over our shoulders in school, at work, at home, on the internet, in stores while we shop, via red-light cameras, we clearly have reasons to believe that we better watch out. Someone is always watching, and the feeling we have is that the watching is to catch us being bad (or do you prefer "naughty"?).

Christmas is a time when God has something very different to say. Instead of watching to catch us, God has always been watching in love. When God sees us making mistakes in our lives, whether small or great, there is a sadness for what could be. When God sees us in turmoil because of the behavior and decisions of others, God seeks to bring peace. When God sees the impact of death, God speaks a word of hope and healing. Angels announced it to shepherds and through them to Mary and Joseph and through a baby and then a man to all of us, "Don't be afraid. Behold, I bring you good news of great joy which is for all people." The message of God among us is not just for the good people, but for all of us – who are sometimes good people and sometimes some degree of naughty. We expectantly can watch for *that* message, which brings freedom rather than a need to look over our shoulders, which always brings gifts and not a lump of coal.

God's Work in Action

As one of this year's goals in our Long-Range Plan, we want to highlight at least 10 people from church who are volunteering outside of Peace. God's work gets done by you in so many different ways; we want to celebrate how you take your gifts from God and apply them! This month's contribution is from Dave & Kay Johnson.

When senior citizens become eligible for Medicare they often have many questions. Too often they don't know whom to ask for help. Sometimes they don't even know that they have choices about their drug plans or supplemental insurance policies which may save them considerable amounts of money. Five years ago my wife, Kay, and I were asked by Senior Advantage, a branch of Riverside hospital in Kankakee dedicated to helping senior citizens, to volunteer to help. We attended a week of classes led by a representative from SHIP (Senior Health Insurance Program), a branch of Illinois Department of Aging. After our training we took an exam to certify our understanding of the issues we had trained for. For the past 5 years we each spend a half a day a month counseling Medicare enrollees. We educate new enrollees, give advice on Part D or drug plans and supplemental insurance, assist those who might not be able to afford the drugs they are taking, and help solve problems where patients are billed incorrectly. During open enrollment for Medicare patients we work many hours entering patient information into a computer program so we can offer advice about which drug plan is most economical for the drugs a patient is taking. We are fortunate to be working with a Riverside employee who is enthusiastic and knowledgeable. She continues to educate us at monthly meetings regarding new and upcoming issues. We are part of a group of 10 volunteers, many who trained with us, and we have come to appreciate their individual contributions and strengths. Our monthly meetings have drawn us closer to these hard working, dedicated people. Our training has made us aware of the rules and regulations of Medicare which in turn helps us as Medicare consumers. We often follow the new legislation proposed to regulate Medicare payments. We have been able also to help many friends and family members. We feel fortunate that we are able to assist so many people, often saving them considerable sums of money. Their gratitude is rewarding and makes us feel good. We are so pleased that we were called to help and made the choice to be SHIP counselors.

Because of You and Your Gifts

On September 20, 2017, Hurricane Maria pummeled Puerto Rico with devastating wind and rain. Weeks after the storm, most of the island's residents remain without power or running water, making each day a struggle. Lutheran World Relief is working with a local partner, Casa Pueblo, to provide assistance in the inland, mountainous community of Adjuntas, which has received little aid. LWR is providing cash vouchers to the neediest families, particularly those with young children and the vulnerable elderly, so they can meet their most immediate needs. LWR is also supplying refillable water filtration units so families no longer have to rely on drinking water from unpredictable bottled water distributions and unsafe sources like streams, as well as solar lanterns. These are some of the stories of the people of Puerto Rico, who despite their hardships, forge ahead in a way they capture in a simple phrase: ¡Vamos Adelante! ("Let's go ahead!")

Discussion Starters for Families

Search Institute has identified five essential actions in Parent-child relationships that help children and teens grow up well. Here is one of the discussion-starter questions that can help you talk with your children and teens about different parts of your relationship. The goal is not to get the right answer, but to share each person's experiences, feelings, and beliefs so you get to know each other better. Ask these questions when people are not rushed or distracted. Start with just one question. Then try others as long as people are interested and available. Have fun discovering new things about each other and your family and watch the newsletter for more discussion-starter questions.

Challenge Growth: Focuses on the ways we encourage, inspire, or influence each other to try to new things, take risks, or overcome obstacles

Use these discussion starters to talk about it together.

- How has someone inspired you to take on a new challenge? What was inspiring to you about it?
- How does challenging other people to grow either strengthen us or hurt your relationship? How does having a strong relationship make it easier or harder to push people to learn and grow?
- What are some challenges we have faced together in our family? In what ways did we grow in the midst of those challenges?
