It might be that the presenter is boring; it might be the material doesn't interest you; it might be that you've had a fight with someone or had something go wrong that day and that's all you can think about. When our minds wander, we are missing something – and hopefully not something important.

December is a month when losing focus is particularly easy. Many of us pack all the normal things into our schedules, plus a dozen more. We have a to-do list (on paper or in our minds) that makes us wonder how we will ever get it all done. We fret over buying presents (augmented by wanting to get the perfect presents.) Our calorie count goes off the chart. Our sleep gets cheated and our tempers get shorter. Some have added concerts or parties or (ands0 family gettogethers. We hear about remembering to focus on what counts and to enjoy the season. Some days we pull it off, and some days we aren't even close.

The great news of Christmas is God's focus.

Throughout the history of God's relationship with the people of Abraham, people frequently lost sight of God and God's plan for how to live. But God didn't lose sight of how God's love was the light to the world and of the world. Even when the leaders and people were so completely enamored with their own plan that God was just a voice to which they felt no need to pay attention, God found ways to stay focused on God's vision. At Christmas, in the birth of Jesus, we get to celebrate how that vision is fully implemented. God's love would not be distracted. What a gift!

No one is going to be fully focused on that gift, no matter how much we would like to be. But just like in a class where our minds have wandered, the goal is to keep returning to the subject at hand; to see how God's love can bless us and the whole world -- it is worth the effort to focus!

Building assets in youth and community

Our asset this month is Positive Values: Resiliency. Here are some suggestions for how to help this asset happen at home, at school, in the community, and in church or public organization.

At home:

Help your children understand the difference between what we can and cannot control and how to deal with the latter emotionally, as well as practically.

Teachers at school:

Talk with students about times when they felt powerless and times when they have felt powerful. Give students choices whenever possible.

In the community:

Train adults who work with youth to affirm their abilities and give them choices whenever possible. Include problem solving skills in job training for teen workers.

In the church or public organization:

Give youth a say in planning activities for the youth program. Within your youth group, explore healthy ways to handle stress and setbacks.
