Trees Need Roots

Do you have a "real" Christmas tree in your home? If you do, you are very much in the minority (18%.) For many of you, all you have ever known is the artificial variety. For those of us who grew up with the real deal, the ritual consisted of trying to find one that seemed "good," bring it into the house, cut the base to fit the stand, perhaps try to get it to stand up straight, keep it watered, and then, at the end, remove it without losing all the needles. Is it any wonder so many of us opted for the "fake" ones?

The reality of all trees is that they need water to live, which they get through their roots. Those same roots are what absorb nutrients and keep the trees anchored in the ground. When a major windstorm comes and topples a large tree, the force that can pull up soil and roots and all is quite impressive, but also marks the end of the tree's life.

For many of us, December is a month where our lives easily can get separated from our own roots. We are scattered by how many things there are to do. We get frustrated by how much time and money we will have spent on people who don't end up appreciating those efforts (at least not enough.) Sometimes we feel trapped by the expectations of others. Sometimes our own dreams of how the season is supposed to turn out and feel are terribly inaccurate, and the letdown makes us sad and or angry.

Even with all those working against us, we also can get nourished by our roots at this time of year. The simple message of God coming to earth to love us from the inside can give us life. The no-holds-barred actions of God and the support of the community of faith can supply us with a strength to deal with life as it really is, and a perspective on how even in the places of smelly sheep and overcrowded inns, meaningful life can be found. It is possible to hear again words of peace (and experience it!)

You have wonderful, God-given and God-giving roots in your ecosystem. Trust them, no matter what December or the other months bring, to outlast all perils and challenges and to nourish you with meaning in your own life and in the lives of others.

Greetings to the Peace Church Community,

It is hard to believe that I am finishing the fourth month of my internship here at Peace Church. This fall has been a time of getting acquainted with the ministry and the wonderful people that make up this church. I have been impressed by the dedication and commitment of all of those who make the many ministries of this church possible. I am looking forward to what the next eight months of my internship will bring.

There are a few projects that will be continuing in the new year. First, we are in the middle of updating and revamping our social media accounts in an attempt to create accounts that will not only showcase what is going on at Peace but will also engage people in the community. Social Media can be a useful tool for a ministry as 70% of American adults are on social media. If you have experience with social media and you would be interested in being part of the team that will manage the pages, please let me know.

In the church or public organization:

Encourage Yonge people to invite their friends to join in group activities. Start or join a peer- helping program. Invite youth to think about ways to positively influence their friends in school and in the community.
