Not Everybody Can Climb a Tree

Albert Einstein once said, "Everybody is a genius. But if you judge a fish by its ability to climb a tree, it will live its whole life believing it is stupid." Many of us spend some time comparing ourselves to other people – how they look, how much money they have, how beautiful their home is, what accomplishments they've achieved, etc. There are a few people whose self-comparisons come out ahead, but I'd guess that most of us frequently don't think we measure up. Because we can't climb *that* tree, so to speak (or not as well or as fast as "most people"), then *we're* not good. Social media reinforces that message to teens and adults every day.

God has a very different idea of our worth and its basis. Paul wrote about it using the image of a body. We have many different parts, but each one is important. (Any of you who have had even a sore toe or a toothache know how that affected you.) Again, he wrote about how the church would need a variety of contributors: apostles, evangelists, teachers, preachers, servers, etc. The goal was each one for the good of all. Jesus himself called people who were outcasts and included society's rejects because they had value. That is the way of God. Our value starts with God giving us value before we can think or act or do anything.

How do you judge yourself? How do we as a society judge others? Imagine the difference it would make if we could keep in mind that not everyone has to be able to climb a tree. Imagine the difference it would make if we could accept that not everyone has to speak English. Imagine valuing people even if they can't walk or hear or act "normal." Imagine if you could give yourself a break when you can't do something (well) but could see your own absolute value to the work of God in this world – to love and serve God and be that self-giving one toward others. You don't need to be an Einstein to figure out that we would have a lot more peace inside and elsewhere.

Discussion Starters for Families

Search Institute has identified five essential actions in Parent-child relationships that help children and teens grow up well. Here is one of the discussion-starter questions that can help you talk with your children and teens about different parts of your relationship. The goal is not to get the right answer, but to share each person's experiences, feelings, and beliefs so you get to know each other better. Ask these questions when people are not rushed or distracted. Start with just one question. Then try others if people are interested and available. Have fun discovering new things about each other and your family and watch the newsletter for more discussion-starter questions.

Challenge Growth: Challenging growth focuses on the ways we encourage, inspire, push, or otherwise influence each other to try new things. These discussion starters can help you think of how challenging growth works, or doesn't work in your family:

- What are some challenges we've faced together in our family? In what ways did we grow during those challenges?
- In what ways have you challenged other people to do things that would help them learn and grow? How did they respond?
- What are ways other family members have challenged you to learn and grow? How did you respond? What made it easier or harder to keep working to complete your task or goal?

Because of You and Your Gifts

Khim and her husband, Chab, are farmers in Kos Run, Cambodia. When they joined a local cooperative led by Life With Dignity, an ELCA World Hunger-supported partner, Khim applied for a microloan to start a small business. With her background in farming, Khim already knew how to grow cucumbers and other vegetables. She just never had the savings or access to credit she needed to expand her farm. With a small loan, Khim invested in a small plot of land - about 100 feet by 150 feet - and started planting. It didn't take long before Khim's small business was profitable. "I've increased my production because there's such a big demand," she says. "People come to buy their vegetables from me every day." Khim and her husband used the profits from vegetable sales to enroll their two children in school and cover the costs of books and school supplies. After repaying their loan, which will help other women in the cooperative, Khim started her own savings fund - and sometimes digs deep to help others in need. "Now I can use my own money to help members of the community," she says.
