Graduation "Theme Song"

Besides "Pomp and Circumstance," some of you will have experienced a graduation speaker or two (or ten) this year. If you haven't this year, perhaps you can recall some from another year. So often there is a common theme to those speeches: have a purpose in life and know who you are (and by the way, you're great.) There will be quotations from a few famous people (and many people you've never heard of before.) Some will go on and on, and too few will get right to the point. Some will use humor and some will try to sound really profound and important. I suppose that on a very rare occasion, a speaker will really touch a graduate's life and make a difference. Mostly though, I think graduates and audience members alike are thinking "when can I get my diploma and get out of here?"

It might be far more productive to skip the graduation speeches and just go for the "theme song" (on ordinary days and not just at a commencement.) Every once in a while ask, "What is my purpose?" and "Who am I?"

At various stages in our lives we may have different answers to the questions. Looking back now, some of our answers seem to have been so shallow we can't believe it. Sometimes our answers were (are) a great big "I don't know." But sometimes our answers help shape us in ways that matter.

God has been trying to help people come up with honest, fulfilling, meaningful answers to the questions for as long as humans have been on the earth. In Jesus we have the clearest, right-to-the-point clues. Who are we? We are not just great, no matter what the speakers may say. We are both broken and whole; have no idea how to live or act sometimes, and other times have at least a glimpse; we are capable some days of greatness and others of pettiness. But we are still always loved by the creator of all that is! Our purpose may seem unclear too often in a mixed-up world. But God invites us to love and serve God and our neighbor. How's that for direct and to the point!

It takes less than a minute to say or read those answers, and a wonderful lifetime of discovery for how to believe and do them. I'll take that over a graduation speech any day!
