#### Creamy or Chunky?

Before the advent of (chocolate) Nutella and other versions like it, there were only two choices for peanut butter: smooth (creamy) or chunky. Eliminating Nutella from the mix, which isn't really peanut butter at all, which of the traditional ones is your favorite? It probably comes down to texture and how that feels in your mouth (or how easily it spreads.) There are all kinds of foods that could be classified by texture and accepted or rejected for that very reason. (You may not be surprised to hear I prefer ice cream to sushi.)

Texture-evaluations are not limited to food, of course. Fabrics/clothing purchases are sometimes made based on it. If you're a kid who has a blanket to suck on, you want something smooth. Some people like silks and satins (smooth), and some want the feel of jeans (chunky.)

Probably many of us would like the texture of our lives only to be smooth and creamy. We would like for life to come to us in manageable doses with positive outcomes all the time. But it doesn't work that way – sometimes way too often. Occasionally, we might like the small chunks and challenges that come our way because they bring variety and interest. But when it is one thing after another, or the one thing is huge, wouldn't most of us prefer "creamy"? I don't know anyone who *wants to* deal with addictions or cancer or divorce or mental illness or failure, for example.

One of the surprises of the Easter season in the church, is the reminder that God *volunteers* to enter the mixed world we inhabit. Beyond simply entering it, we see in Jesus a God who is not afraid to take on the chunky spots. Rejections, misunderstandings, loneliness, being attacked, having to deal with stubbornness – you name it and Jesus probably faced it. Even the worst chunk of them all, death, was experienced firsthand...and overcome.

Our relationship with God is not going to limit life to one wonderful texture. But our relationship can assure us that whatever momentary challenges come our way, they don't define our whole life. God can transform the worst textures into something "redeemed," and seeks to infuse meaning into all the creamy and chunky textures.

#### Because of You and Your Gifts

On a half-acre on the island of Nias, Indonesia, Yaatulo and his wife, Mariata, grow bananas to support themselves and their two children. While they work hard, the income from the bananas wasn't enough to support the family. One day while working, Yaatulo heard about a development program of the Center for Disaster Risk Management & Community Development Studies, which is supported by gifts to ELCA World Hunger. He decided to join, and soon he had the support to borrow enough money for chili seed. Over two months, Yaatulo and Mariata planted more than 1,000 chili bushes. Chilis can be harvested multiple times per year, giving farmers more opportunities to sell them at market and have extra income. Thanks to your gifts, farmers like Yaatulo have improved access to tools, training, livestock, seeds and more that will help their families increase farm production and have more to eat and sell at market.
