What Is Your Net Worth?

Bill Gates of Microsoft fame is only worth 106 billion dollars. (Perhaps we should take up a "go-fund-me" collection for him, since he is only number two on the Forbes list of richest people.) Wanting to determine our own net worth or that of someone else tends not to matter most days....unless you're looking for a loan/mortgage!

Society measures our net worth in terms of dollars, but I think God has a very different method. For example, Jesus lifted up people who were rejected by others, but whose true inner worth surpassed a Powerball winner's by an infinite amount. God could take a stuttering loser (Moses) or a too-young boy (Jeremiah) and transform them into powerful witnesses to the people in power. Society may have pitied a poor widow and how little she had, but when she gave liberally from her heart, Jesus said her net worth was rich-beyond-belief.

Too often we measure our own worth by society's standards of accumulated money wealth or power riches or some other model of "success." I think God's system is far richer and more powerful and fulfilling. This is the system that allows you to stop and have your heart moved by a video clip of a kid selling lemonade to benefit soldiers. This is the method that celebrates a less-abled person making it across a stage to receive a diploma. This is the call inside us to care about people who are cold or hungry or rejected by society whether they are black or brown or wear their hair funny or have a different version of sexuality. People who are God-type-rich bless the world because they forgive and are compassionate and humble and can respect the world as a gift to be well-managed.

I am so grateful for the people of God here at Peace and elsewhere in my life whose net worth has been off-the-charts by God's standards, independent of their assets from the world's point of view. When we demonstrate what God can do in and through us, we make the world richer and are worth a Bill Gates-equivalent in God's system.

Dear Members and Friends of Peace,

This month there will be several youth events. However, the largest of those youth events is Antioch. The theme for Antioch this year is H.I.P.P.O. Please ask our youth what this stands for! We will spend some time during the weekend learning about and exploring God's promises to God's people. Another word often used for God's promises is covenant. I am looking forward to, with the help of many amazing volunteers, teaching our youth about the covenants that God has made with the Church and all creation.

You might be able to name some of them or perhaps remember the stories. God makes a covenant with Noah, Abraham, Israel, and King David. With each covenant or promise God makes relationship with God's people and there is a partnership that is born. We know though that people often fall short of the promises that we have made to God. Over and over again God's people break their part of the agreement or covenant.

At Antioch we will talk about why it is hard to keep our promises to God and we will be reminded that even though we break our promises God is faithful and creates a new covenant with us. We will explore together God's final covenant with the Church and all creation. God knew that people could not on their own keep their promises. Temptation and sin get the best of each of us from time to time and there is grace for that.

God sent a final covenant, a final promise to restore the relationship between God and God's people! I wonder if you can guess who that is? Let me give you a hint; "This is my blood, the new covenant, shed for you and for all people" the right answer is always Jesus. I am excited to invite our youth to understand their relationship to Jesus in a new way. We will investigate Jesus as promise to us and to all people. What does it mean that God gave God's self as a promise that we would always be forgiven and always be special to God?

These are giant and complex ideas! I invite you, the adults of our congregation to explore these ideas too and engage our youth in conversation about it.

While at Antioch we will be watching a video from *The Bible Project* on Covenants. It could be fun to watch that video on your own. This video will set the tone for our conversation and it will be something our youth can refer back to. To find the video you go to

https://bibleproject.com/explore/covenants/. I find the videos on this site to be very entertaining but also really informative. Feel free to explore the other videos while you are on the site.

My hope is that as our youth grow in an understanding of Jesus as promise that we as a congregation will grow too. May your March be filled with wonder about our awesome God and the gift of relationship that he has given to each of us!
