Self-giving love turns out to be the biggest bargain of all time.

From Deacon Shari Trotter

Dear Members and Friends of Peace,

We have spent a lot of time, in our adult education hour, talking about women. We have discussed women in ministry and the joys and struggles that come with that vocation. We have studied the draft of the new social statement, "Women and Justice: One in Christ", and explored the deep roots of patriarchy and sexism. As a woman, and as a woman in ministry, I am deeply moved that we as a congregation are willing to have tough discussions and to disagree while still being open to conversation with the other. Our culture is plagued with so many people who have dug in their heels on their side of the imaginary lines created by sin. We as a congregation are taking steps to be a witness to the world that the love of Jesus is not one of complacency or entrenchment in one's opinions, but rather a powerful, motivating, patient, and paradoxical love for the world.

May we continue to have tough discussions that are rooted in faith and guided by love. May Peace be a place where all can come and find the love of God in every single nook and cranny. May Peace also be a place where all can come and find a forum for discussion, challenge, and mutual respect. May we as a congregation be a beacon of Christ centered love for our community and our world.

Because of You and Your Gifts

Our gift of goats – who knew it could be so helpful? Nearly 70 percent of India's rural families depend upon agriculture for their livelihoods. In the small, remote village of Temraraiyat, the economy depends on rain. Scarce water and not having diverse crops limited people's incomes. Then goats arrived. Ten farmers received one animal each from Tripti Field Workers, funded in part by the Evangelical Lutheran Church in Madhya Pradesh (ELCM) and supported by your gifts to ELCA World Hunger. Goats multiply fast, produce milk to drink or sell and provide manure that can be used for farming. Adding goats to their farms means the farmers in Temraraiyat are a big step closer to financial stability and sustainability. Thank you!!!!

Caregiver Tip of the Month

From Today's Caregiver Article by LeAnne Austin, RN As difficult as it can be when illness or disability enters into a home, there needs to be equal focus on both the needs of the child and the needs of the person who is ill. Achieving a balance between each person's needs allows the child to focus on age-appropriate issues such as school, interactions with peers and personal growth, without nurturing feelings of guilt over not "doing more" with respect to the ill or disabled person in the home. Verbalizing interest in the child's life provides positive reinforcement for development of interests outside the home. This can also help to decrease mood changes associated with fear or loss of control, as they have the opportunity to succeed outside the home environment with the support and approval of those in the home. Questions Kids Ask

More great questions keep on coming in! This month we had three. (1) "Where is heaven?" Heaven is where God is. It isn't a place you can drive or fly or sail to. It isn't a place at all, in one sense. But in a bigger sense, heaven is so much better than any place could ever be. We will live with God in peace and joy and forever be free from all the bad things that happen. (2) "Why does God live so long?" Because "time" is something God created, God doesn't live by our clocks and calendars. The closest we can come to how this feels is to be at an event where you are having so much fun, you have no idea that time is passing. (3) "If being a Lutheran is by the teachings of Martin Luther, and he was a Protestant, aren't we then Protestants?" Originally, Luther was also called a Protestant (protestor). Soon his group of followers were called Lutherans (which he didn't really want because he wanted people to focus on God in Jesus.) All those others who protested against the Roman Church were grouped together with the label of Protestants. So, we are both Protestants and Lutherans. (In math, we'd be called a subset.)

Texting – Another Option When You're in Crisis

THE SHORT VERSION: Text HOME to 741741 from anywhere in the United States, anytime, about any type of crisis. A live, trained Crisis Counselor receives the text and responds, all from our secure online platform. The volunteer Crisis Counselor will help you move from a hot moment to a cool moment. (AND IN A BIT MORE DETAIL...) First, you're in crisis. That doesn't just mean suicide: it's any painful emotion for which you need support. You text us at 741741. Your opening message can say anything. The first two responses are automated. They tell you that you're being connected with a Crisis Counselor and invite you to share a bit more. The Crisis Counselor is a trained volunteer, not a professional. They can provide support, but not medical advice. It usually takes less than five minutes to connect you with a Crisis Counselor. (It may take longer during high-traffic times). When you've reached a Crisis Counselor, they'll introduce themselves, reflect on what you've said, and invite you to share at your own pace. (And don't forget the standard option, if you're thinking about suicide, call 1-800- SUICIDE.)

Building assets in youth and community

Teachers at school:

Encourage students to write down their dreams and short-term and long-term goals. Include student leaders in decision making committees and boards. Help students to see that there is a purpose in everything that they are learning in school.

In the community:

Recognize the skill and accomplishments of the youth in your community. Be a mentor for youth whose dreams are related to your own life's area of expertise.

In the church or public organization:

Give young people an active role in planning the youth program. Encourage young people to question and develop their own values and inner motivation. Help children and teens identify, nurture, and celebrate their gifts.
